

Original Preface to the Roll of Honour

It is earnestly hoped that this Roll of those –

‘Whose hearts were as brave to meet the foe
As the thin red line of years ago’,

Will be found to be complete; but should there be any regrettable omissions, the names will be included in an addendum.

The Roll contains almost 1,200 names, or about one-fifth of the population. The town can boast that no conscientious objector ever appeared before Tribunal.

It has been found impracticable to distinguish most of those who were wounded in their Country’s service, because of the absence of available records; and it has proved equally impossible to ascertain the rank and unit of very many: consequently these particulars have been almost wholly omitted.

Middlewich was worthily represented in every arm of the Forces – Army, Navy, Marines, R.A.F., R.N.A.S., and anti-aircraft – as well as in the manufacture of munitions. Her patriotic sons came from far distant lands such as Australia and Canada –

‘Tell them, O guns, that we have heard the call,
That we have sworn, and will not turn aside,
That we will onward till we win or fall,
That we will keep the faith for which they died’.

Middlewich men have served nobly on battleship and mine-sweeper, on horse and foot, on camel and tank, as well as under the sea and in the air; beginning with the “Contemptibles,” who for a time gallantly stemmed the onrushing grey tide at Mons, and ending with the occupation of the Rhine towns.

Her daughters courageously served behind the lines while the Hun bombs were dealing death and destruction in hospitals around.

Her sons fought fearlessly on land and water. The shell-swept battlefields of France, Gallipoli (the “Cheshire Ridge”), Belgium, Palestine, Italy, Salanica, Mesopotamia, East Africa and Russia witnessed brave hearts from the old town striking a blow for Honour, for Liberty, for Righteousness; and most of these arenas were stained and sanctified with their life blood.

They endured the privations of trench life in foul weather, when –

‘Not an inch of him was clean
Only his honour, spotless, rare;’

And in the arid Aceldama realized the full significance of the words from the Cross: “I thirst!”

They experienced – some for four long weary years – the unspeakable horrors of the prisoners’ laagers of Germany, Bulgaria and Turkey, where many would have starved to death but for the parcels sent from home.

A large number brilliantly distinguished themselves, and one took part in the glorious feat at Zeebrugge.

Those who won decorations are modestly reticent about their own trilling achievements, but testify to the courageous deeds of others which escaped the notice of those in command.

Through no fault of their own many did not participate in the actual fighting, but they did their "bit" bravely and creditably behind the lines while Fritz, "strafing" them from the air, killed and maimed those around.

About fifty held His Majesty's Commission, a fifth of whom "died that we might live". Large numbers were wounded several times, and at least one is entitled to display seven burnished stripes of gold.

Some families had all their sons in the forces – one can proudly boast of six – and in some homes more than one loved one won deathless glory. At least two poor widows lost two sons. Three who gained distinction made the supreme sacrifice; in fact, the long list of those who, in the words of J. W. Streets –

'To liberty their heritage they gave
And won immortal glory at the grave',*

May prove to be almost unparalleled in towns of the size of the one-time Royal Borough. As we picture the many hallowed mounds, surmounted by rude-shaped wooden crosses, around the battlefields, we recall Rupert Brooke's famous lines –
'If I should die, think only this of me:

That there's some corner of a foreign land
That is forever England.'*

Their deeds were glorious, and the memory of them is imperishable. They upheld our greatest, our noblest traditions. Inspired by the knowledge that their cause was right against brutal might, they fought tenaciously and unflinchingly against almost overwhelming odds, braving the diabolical devices for torturing, maiming and killing invented by a fiendish foe; and, by their heroic courage in battles which even the bravest described as veritable infernos, they helped to save the world and civilisation, and Canon F. G. Scott's beautiful prayer finds an echo in our hearts -

'Dear Christ, who reign'st above the flood
Of human tears and human blood,
A weary road these men have trod;
Oh! House them in the Home of God'.

Some Middlewich men there are whose names are not here recorded who were nevertheless patriotic sons of the Empire, for they voluntarily offered themselves for service, but were rejected on medical grounds. It was not the lot of all to hear "the mad, hoarse shout of battle," for many, perforce, had to "carry on" at home to provide the sinews of war, and see that the fighters' needs were supplied; while the daughters of the old wych-town nursed the wounded, packed prisoners' parcels, provided comforts for those exposed to the hardships and rigours of life in the field, made munitions, and generally filled the places of the absent boys. Those at home also made herculean efforts for many war organisations, raised over £10,000, and did everything, in the words of the well-known war song, (the authoress of which was killed in a Hun Air Raid,) to "Keep the Home Fires Burning."

Child, M.A., Major Arthur Gascoigne Fernie, B.A., Capt., E.H.	Senior Chaplain, 53 rd Division, mentioned in Despatches (wounded). Mentioned in Despatches, Chaplain Australian Forces.
Haddon, Capt., John Hugo	Mentioned in Despatches (wounded; brother killed).
Irwin, Major, Cuthbert	M.C., 7 th Bn. Cheshire Regt., regarded as a fearless fighter.
Moss, Capt., William Henry	M.C. and Croix de Guerre with Palms 1914-5 Star. Conspicuous gallantry in taking two villages and consolidating. Wounded seven times and "gassed". C.B., etc. Mentioned in Despatches.

Arrowsmith, Pte., Joseph	M.M., Dressing wounds and carrying in wounded under heavy fire, although wounded. (Killed; also brother).
Bradburn, Nurse, Maria Bebbington, Sergt., John	Royal Red Cross (2 nd Class). D.C.M., and twice mentioned in Despatches. Led section, and captured four machine guns and 48 men (more than his section), killing the rest of the gun crew. Wounded several times.

Birchall, Sergt., Samuel	Mentioned in Despatches for valuable services on anti-aircraft defences in United Kingdom.
Buckley, Cpl., Frank	M.M., Devotion to duty in field. In charge of party of 30 while wiring and entrenching a position three nights during heavy bombardment. Wounded (brother killed).
Beckett, Pte., Thomas	M.M., Fetching in wounded officer under fire and leading a party of men to safety although almost surrounded. Wounded.
Bancroft, Pte., Thomas	M.M., dressing wounded under fire.
Clarke, Lce.-Cpl., Joseph	M.M., stayed behind on retreat, and brought wounded in notwithstanding approach of enemy.
Evanson, Pte., Thomas	M.M., brought wounded man in under fire. Taken prisoner later.
Fox, Sergt., James Henry	M.M., took charge when officer killed; flanked two machine guns, and captured crew (24 men). Also awarded certificate for rescuing child from drowning at Middlewich.
Healey, Sergt., Harry	M.M., took command when officer wounded. Although wounded, he made a personal reconnaissance, and obtained valuable information.
Edge, Sergt.-Major, William	Mentioned in Despatches (wounded).
Hazell, Sergt., Roger	M.M., took charge when officers missing, holding position for 18 hours. Meritorious Service Medal for picking up and throwing away a live bomb with 5 seconds fuse. Croix de Guerre with Star. Took charge of company, captured trench, turning enemy's machine guns on them. (Brother taken prisoner).
Hamlett, George Frederick	Medal of O.B.E. Persisted in doing dangerous work at Munitions Works, with certainty of suffering from poisoning as the result.
Jinks, Pte., James	M.M., took ration party up front line under heavy fire. Also mentioned in Despatches for carrying message to firing line when communications destroyed. Wounded several times.

Lawrenson, Signaller, Herbert Edward	M.M., rescued man buried in an observation post by shell explosion, and got two other bodies out under heavy fire.
Marshall, Pte., Andrew	D.C.M. Attended to and brought in wounded men under heavy fire. Wounded, (Brother killed and one taken prisoner).
McHugh, Lce.-Cpl., Michael	M.M., conveyed messages under fire from Headquarters to various companies. Wounded. Mentioned in Despatches for rescuing twenty miners from mine that had been filled with gas.
Parker, Sergt., Fred	Mentioned in Despatches (killed).
Siddall, Lce.-Cpl., John William	M.M., Took charge of Platoon and machine guns when Non.-Com. Officers wounded, and advanced and gained objective in spite of heavy fire. Wounded four times.
Shaw, Pte., Frank	D.C.M. Although subjected to heavy fire, put enemy machine gun out of action by bombing, and though wounded, continued bombing, withdrawing pins with teeth, and throwing with left hand. Also Italian Silver Medal for Military Valour.
Sproston, Pte., James Ellam	M.M. Took messages under heavy shell fire, and attended to wounded. Wounded.
Sutcliffe, Appren., Thomas Arthur	D.S.M. At age of 16 took charge of vessel when man at helm killed, and brought it in safely under fire. Also received cheque for 20 guineas from the Manchester Liners Ltd. and certificate and medal of Mercantile Marine.
Wilkinson, Pte., James	M.M. Got 300 bombs out of dug-out (30-40 ft. deep) when on fire. (Killed; also brother. Another brother wounded and taken prisoner).
Woodbine, Pte., John	M.M. Fetched wounded in under heavy fire. Wounded, etc., several times.
Wagstaffe, Cpl., Ralph Thompson	M.M. Brought in wounded under heavy machine gun fire. Wounded.
